Well it's the end of March and the Kia Kima District is “right on track” to achieve 100% of its' Friends of Scouting goal. We held two very successful dinners in March that put us at 84% of our \$70,000 goal. A very special thanks goes to Jon Jones and his trailblazers for all their hard work in the Family Campaign. The District has one troop to turn in their cards and we will be 100% complete.

The Race to Scouting is just around the corner. This is the national campaign to recruit new families into Scouting which uses a racing theme with national and local marketing efforts. The Join Scouting nights this year will be September 6th, 11th and 13th. Experts tell us it may require up to seven impressions to the Scouting message in order to get them to attend a Pack Join Scouting Night. Here are some marketing strategies that have been proven to work.

1. Wear Your Uniform to School Day 1-2 days prior to the scheduled District Round-up Date.
2. Church-Oriented Recruiting (advise churches using bulletins and inserts, church websites, newsletters, etc.
3. School-Oriented Recruiting during the first two weeks of school (flyers, signs, speakers to advertise in the school, attend PTA meetings, use lawn signs, school websites, and attend Meet the Teacher Night.
4. Utilize the Bring a Friend Card with youth in Packs to encourage Scouts to bring friends into the unit.
5. Identify Units that have struggled in the past with following through with their round-up efforts.
6. Use Grocery Boys as an effective way to get our Scouting message to potential customers (use them in MOVIE THEATERS, CHURCHES, LOWES, HOME DEPOT, etc.

Again, thanks for all you do in Scouting and making a difference in the lives of our youth
